## **PPG**

#### **PUPIL PREMIUM INCOME**

Pupil Premium was introduced by the Government in 2011 to provide additional funding to address the gap in educational attainment between socially disadvantaged children and young people compared to their peers, thus enabling them to reach their potential and secure long term economic well being.

The Government has determined that the pupil premium for 2016 to 2017 will include pupils recorded in the January 2016 school census and alternative provision census who were looked after by an English or Welsh local authority immediately before being adopted, or who left local authority care on a special guardianship order or child arrangements order (previously known as a residence order). These are collectively referred to as post-LAC in these conditions of grant. Ever 6 FSM includes pupils recorded in the January 2016 school census who are known to have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) since May 2010, as well as those first known to be eligible at January 2016. The annual PPG for 2016-17 is £1,900 per student

Within Learning Opportunities all students have Education, Health & Care Plans (EHCP's). Their additional needs / barriers to learning include Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH), Communication and Interaction and Cognition and Learning.

The identification of priorities is determined by consideration of attainment data, observation, our understanding of individual student's development needs, and effectiveness of interventions. Progress is tracked carefully to ensure that students are working towards reaching their potential.

- At Learning Opportunities we ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all students.
- Pupil premium funding has been allocated to provide additional training opportunities for staff to further improve students' educational attainment and long term well- being, and provide additional enrichment and engagement opportunities.

#### The amount of pupil premium grant in 2015/16 was £9130.00

How was this grant spent and the outcome.

### The projected pupil premium grant for 2016/17 is £10,130

The exact number of students in receipt of PPG changes throughout the year and some 'out of county' Authorities do not allocate PPG. Our projection is based on 19 students being on roll at the beginning of the Autumn Term 2016, of which 6 were in receipt of the Pupil Premium Grant (PPG). This constitutes 32% of our whole school cohort.

#### 2016-17 Priorities

Throughout the year, we will continue to use the PPG for projects and interventions to support the progress of eligible students, including:

- Supporting students emotionally, socially and academically.
- Bespoke interventions to ensure progress is made from their individual starting points.
- Providing opportunities to extend students experiences of life away from their immediate environment through residential activitties.
- Training for staff to deliver specific interventions.

The biggest barriers to success of our students is low literacy levels and poor working memory. It is our intention to continue with 1:1 Literacy intervention and extend this to include Numeracy. We will also introduce a bespoke reading programme to address the low literacy levels of identified students. This will involve a daily reading slot, small group and individual where their reading progress will be tracked and the outcomes used to inform individual intervention programmes for each student.
